LIST OF PROHIBITED ARTICLES FOR PASSENGERS

In exercise of powers conferred by article 13, subsection 1 & article 34, subsection 1 of the Civil Aviation Law as promulgated under Royal Decree No. 14 of 2013, Kingdom of Bahrain mandates strict security measures to keep prohibited articles/items from being taken on board an aircraft. The table below is not an exhaustive list of prohibited items and some items may be allowed to be carried under Special Permission (SP). Restrictions exist pertaining to Liquids Aerosols & Gels (LAGs) including certain classes of Dangerous Goods/Hazardous Materials are also in place, passengers are advised to check respective airline websites and/or Bahrain Airport Company website well before departures from Bahrain International Airport regarding queries about limitations/restrictions for items which can be carried on board.
